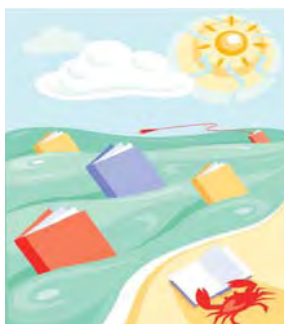

Making Meaning For One And Oneself

Over the course of the year, this column has served as an opportunity for elaboration upon the guiding principles and central tenets of the Senior House program. Whether the point of emphasis was reflection, emotion, relevance, connection to mission, collaboration, or metacognition, each orbits the central purpose of adolescence: making meaning for and of oneself. Once we embrace this process, we are both more willing and able to engage the ideas of others. To this end, the Senior House summer read is *This I Believe: The Personal Philosophies of Remarkable Men and Women*. It is a read that will be equally thought-provoking and accessible to students and parents.

From 1951 to 1955, Edward R. Murrow hosted *This I Believe*, a daily radio program that reached 39 million listeners. On this broadcast, Americans – both well known and unknown – read five-minute essays about their personal philosophy of life. They shared insights about individual values that shaped their daily actions. The first volume of *This I Believe* essays, published in 1952, sold 300,000 copies—more than any other book in the U. S. during that year except for the *Bible*. In fact, these Murrow broadcasts were so popular that curriculum was even developed to encourage American high school students to compose essays about their most significant personal beliefs.

While reading these essays, one cannot help but to think of the people and values that have guided them over the course of a lifetime. These philosophies are not objectives to be obtained, but rather lights that lead. Some will permeate a lifetime, others will flicker to a quick end. Some are leant to others, others are hidden away. Regardless, they inform us and others and are important for an individual to articulate – or at least try to articulate – throughout life because they help us keep our way ... or even discover a new way.

A former colleague maintained the fundamental difference that explains why adults love learning so much while high-schoolers often resist it, is adults get to choose what they learn about, and ownership begets inspiration. While students, too often, have their learning dictated to them. So as parents and students go through this summer, I wish for all to take delight in making meaning and then to share that meaning with others. Then, perhaps, at an afternoon cookout, at the beach, or around the supper table, a new tradition will emerge of sharing with each other what you believe.
